

Our Mission

The Sheltering Arms Foundation invests in the lives of Minnesota's children to help them reach their full potential. We fund non-profit organizations and support policies that benefit children and their families who have the least access to resources.

Our History

Sheltering Arms, founded in 1882 by Deaconess Annette Relf, is governed by a Board of Trustees composed of women members of the Episcopal Church of Minnesota. In response to the changing needs of children, Sheltering Arms successively operated an orphanage, a hospital for children with polio and a day school for special needs children. In 1983, Sheltering Arms was reincorporated as The Sheltering Arms Foundation. Consistent with the beliefs of the founders, the Foundation continues to be committed to the well being of children.

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Leadership Letter

Dear Friends,

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Sheltering Arms began its 2013-2014 year with a retreat focused on diversity and equity and carried that focus through the year. Minnesota has one of the largest achievement gaps in the country between children of color and their white peers. Eliminating that gap is a key goal of Sheltering Arm's most recent strategic plan. The plan commits Sheltering Arms to do this through funding and policy strategies to ensure that all Minnesota children meet social, emotional, cognitive and physical milestones to be ready for kindergarten and then prepared for seventh grade. We are increasingly looking to align our strategies with our collective impact partners such as the Start Early Funders and Ignite Afterschool to see the greatest possible impact of our work.

It's great to be able to look back over the last year and see the exciting results of the efforts that we have been involved with to help Minnesota children and families. Thanks go to our grantees, trustees, donors and partners in non-profits, funder coalitions, education, government and within the Episcopal Church.

This past year, our efforts included:

- \$450,000 in grants to 38 organizations as well four grants to support work on behalf of children and families at Episcopal congregations.
- · A successful launch of our new on-line grantmaking capability
- Our first Sheltering Arms Sunday on August 6, celebrated in numerous Episcopal communities around the state
- A celebration of the 30th anniversary of the foundation and the 130th anniversary of the founding of Sheltering Arms organization
- A gathering of grantees and trustees to share stories of success
- A Children and Youth Issues Convening in partnership with the Start Early Funders Coalition, the MN Council of Non-Profits and the MN Council on Foundations that attracted over 1,000 participants
- Work on behalf of children through the Governor's Early Learning Council, The Start Early Funders, Minnesota Youth Funders Network, Ignite Afterschool and more

2013-2014 saw continued legislative victories for young children in Minnesota. Through our work as a part of the Start Early Funders Coalition, we participated in the efforts that secured an added \$4.6 million for scholarships to high quality care and education for low-income 3 and 4 year olds and their younger siblings. These new scholarships make additional opportunities available to children but at best, this funding can serve only 10% of the eligible children. We will be looking towards the next few sessions to make sure all Minnesota children have the opportunity to start kindergarten ready and prepared for success in school and life!

We thank you for your continuing involvement with the Sheltering Arms Foundation on behalf of our children and our future.

Children's Theatre Company is the largest theater for young audiences in North America and one of the largest professional theaters in the Twin Cities. Sheltering Arms supported its Early Childhood Initiative that brings high quality theater arts based learning experiences based on best practices in early education to early learners ages two to six from low-income families in the Twin Cities. The program provides learning opportunities for the children's caregivers as well, with professional development opportunities for early childhood teachers and opportunities for low-income parents to engage in playbased learning with their young children.

Children's Theatre Company has worked closely with a researcher from the U of M's Center for Early Education and Development both to develop the programming and to evaluate outcomes of this program and all CTC early childhood programs. The evaluation especially emphasizes social-emotional indicators or "developing the muscle of empathy". Partners for the program included twelve early childhood programs such as La Crèche Early Childhood Center, Greater Minneapolis, Crisis Nursery, Head Start programs in both Minneapolis and St. Paul and numerous school based programs.

The Northland Foundation is the Minnesota Initiative Foundation that serves the northeast corner of the state. It has run the very successful youth collaborative KIDS PLUS which has initiated youth programming in many towns in the region. Under the auspices of an Atlantic Philanthropies grant, it has been implementing a program called AGE to age, a grassroots intergenerational initiative aimed at enhancing at risk children's educational and social skills development.

Sheltering Arms supported a program within the AGE to age Program called the Reading Pals Pilot Project in three KIDS PLUS communities: McGregor, Proctor and Moose Lake. All of these communities have a very high proportion of low-income youth. Older adults in the AGE to age program work to develop literacy skills with children ages three years through third grade level.

This project is helping children to become successful readers, and to develop relationships with caring adults. This kind of community involvement is essential to the social and academic success of young children. The project uses the energy and skills of adults over 55 to benefit youth and is a model of how communities can mobilize this resource.



"Each of the three AGE to age communities has leveraged year-two funding to further build the impact of their Reading Pals programs," stated Lynn Haglin, the Northland Foundation Vice President/KIDS PLUS Director. "And they report that the older adult volunteers seem to have a special knack for establishing trusted, caring relationships with the children that nurtures their enthusiasm for reading and learning."

Appetite for Change

Appetite for Change's Fresh Start Garden program was a pilot project that brought a broad group of partners together for this innovative early childhood program in north Minneapolis. Fresh Start Garden builds community and serves preschoolers through a gardening and cooking program that used community based participatory research led by the U of M to document its results.

Appetite For Change (AFC) partnered with LaCreche Early Childhood Center, a 4-star Parent Aware rated center. The young children were mentored by youth ages 14-18 from the WE WIN Institute who work with the children and serve as role models. La Creche, WE WIN and a youth advisory board gave input into a curriculum co-developed by AFC and the Landscape Arboretum to make sure that it is culturally relevant. Staff at all of the project's partners received training in this method of evaluation in order to continue to use it after the pilot year.

Advocacy Work at the Sheltering Arms Foundation Helping Minnesota's Children Reach their Full Potential

The Sheltering Arms Foundation has chosen to focus on advocacy for children's issues as an important addition to our direct service grantmaking. Some of that work is done through grants to non-profits doing advocacy work. It is also done through partnerships with organizations both locally and nationally, outreach to Episcopal congregations about children's policy issues and by providing training opportunities to our grantees and other non-profits serving children to advocate for themselves.

Our advocacy is focused on early childhood and out-of-school-time issues as a strategy to help eliminate the opportunity gap for Minnesota's most vulnerable children and to ensure that they have the chance to reach their full potential.

Giving Garden Plymouth \$1,000

Sheltering Arms supported the Church of the Epiphany in Plymouth to engage the church's youth in a garden to provide vegetable to the NEAR food shelf. NEAR serves 1,200 low-income individuals each month from Robbinsdale, Crystal and New Hope. Of that number, over half are children. NEAR's clients often go without fresh produce because of the high price. In summer, children are particularly likely to be deprived of fresh produce because they are not in school and are missing the nutritious free lunch they receive during the school year.





"I delivered 23 pounds of fresh beets, cucumbers, radishes, peas and beans to NEAR this am. When I arrived with my dewy, just-picked veggies, a dejected staff person was pulled rotted leaves off a pile of donated lettuce, looking for those that could be salvaged for clients to eat. It was a stark contrast between nourishing, mouthwatering veggies just twenty minutes from the ground and a pile of rotting greens just minutes from the dumpster. Thank you to all of Epiphany for your generosity and kindness in starting the garden and thank you to all the gardeners who make time in their busy lives to make our garden grow!"

The Foundation uses the accrual method of accounting for financial reporting purposes. Under the accrual method, revenues are recorded when earned, contributions are recorded when an unconditional promise to give has been received, and expenses are recorded when incurred. Grants are recorded when approved by the Foundation's Board of Trustees. Grant awards that extend more than one year into the future are not recorded due to their conditional nature as the grantee needs to meet certain requirements before subsequent year awards are approved for payment.

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
